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## ***Community Reentry Program Quick Facts***

Q: How can I get into the program?

A: If you meet the admission criteria and don't have a case manager, you can speak to the Guest Advocate or ask to see Kanui.

Q: Why does I.H.S. have a program like this?

A: Many of our guests suffer from substance abuse problems and have difficulties reintegrating into the community, especially those who have probation, parole, and deferral statuses. We aim to help them to reenter the community by giving them the tools and support they need to be successful.

Q: I want a bunk bed but don't qualify for CRP. Is there a way that I can still get one?

A: Speak to the Guest Advocate or your case manager. There are some bunks available for non-participants, however, random drug testing and active participation in case management are required.

Q: I am a probation/parole officer and would like one of my clients to get help from CRP. How would I go about doing so?

## **Community Reentry Program**

Helping men on probation, parole, deferral, and those returning from prison to obtain sobriety, employment, housing, and dignity.

## ***WHAT IS THE CRP?***

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The Community Reentry Program is a case management program designed to serve the needs of men who have been released from prison, are on probation or parole, or are awaiting trial **and** have a coexisting substance abuse problem. We have the capability to serve persons with **non-primary** mental illnesses that are not eligible for our mental health case management programs. However, such admissions are conducted on a case-by-case basis. In order to be admitted, applicants must verbalize a commitment to live a clean and sober lifestyle and participate in U.A.s and sign a statement attesting to the same.

CRP personnel work with persons served (“participants”) throughout the duration of the service episode to provide a centralized point of care coordination and maximize the quality of care that our participants receive from their medical, substance abuse, vocational, educational, and social support needs.

## ***WHERE ARE SERVICES DELIVERED?***

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CRP delivers services where the persons served reside. Because all participants begin as guests in our shelter, we begin services in the shelter environment. As participants transition out into the community, our staff will follow them out to ensure that service continuity among providers is maintained.

## ***WHO PROVIDES SERVICES?***

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CRP services are provided by our Forensic Assiatant, the Forensic Case Manager, Program Coordinator, and other professional staff drawn from our Social Services department and community partners. The team is composed of persons with experience in mental health, substance abuse, case management, and the criminal justice system and is overseen by our Clinical Supervisor who is a Certified Substance

Abuse Counselor, Licensed Marriage and Family Therapist, and Registered Nurse.

## ***WHO CAN JOIN THE CRP?***

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To be eligible for the Community Reentry Program, an applicant must: 1) Be a male guest at the Sumner shelter, 2) Be on probation, parole, deferral, or have been released from prison within the last 6 months, 3) be willing to pursue a clean and sober lifestyle, participate in random drug testing, and attend sober support and skill building classes, and 4) be ineligible for mental health case management services.

## ***HOW DOES CRP HELP PARTICIPANTS?***

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Members of the CRP are assigned bunk beds on the second floor of the Sumner shelter and receive case management services from our Team with a focus on reentering the community

Sober support activities, relapse prevention, and skill building activities are provided seven days a week, including field trips to AA/NA meetings. Urinalyses are conducted randomly by program staff and serve to ensure the integrity of our sober support community. Our case management services support gains made in treatment and actively work to build cognitive insights and behavioral skills needed to avoid relapse, criminal recidivism, and chronic homelessness.

Participants who successfully complete the program by obtaining income, maintaining sobriety, attending sober support, job training, and skill building activities will be eligible to receive assistance with first month’s rent/deposit assistance.

## ***HOW DO I GET INTO THE PROGRAM?***

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Program screening and admissions are conducted by the Program Coordinator Monday thru Thursday from 8am to 10am and from 1pm

to 3pm. Special screenings and admissions can be arranged by appointment for other times.

## ***WHAT IS THE ASSESSMENT PROCEDURE?***

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Following intake, participants work with the Program Coordinator to determine their level of service, recovery needs, and to develop a crisis plan. Psychometric assessment tools include the Resource Affiliated Functional Level Scale (RAFLS), Addiction Severity Index-5<sup>th</sup> ed. (ASI), and Level of Service Inventory (LSI). Participants also participate in a psychosocial history and mental status evaluation.

## ***HOW ARE RECOVERY PLANS MADE?***

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Recovery planning takes place with the input of the participant, program staff, and collateral providers, including probation/parole officers when applicable. Plans are completed at intake and are revised at least once every six months, with more frequent review taking place when needed.

## ***WHAT ARE THE DISCHARGE CRITERIA?***

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Participants may be discharged due to active substance use, return to incarceration, or successful completion of the program. Participants are expected to remain in the program for an average of 6 to 12 months following move-out from the shelter. However, certain persons may receive services for up to 6 additional months (for a total of 18 months after move out) if approved by the Program Coordinator and Clinical Supervisor.
